Update

Following a meeting with Daniel Metzger, Transport Manager at Ealing Council, we are optimistic about our progress. The Council is committed to a pilot Home zone scheme in the Five Roads Forum area. They have asked a working party to develop three or four different schemes from which they will draw up plans for consultation with all residents via exhibitions, brochures and resident surveys.

It is likely that the Controlled Parking Zone survey will be incorporated into the zones survey.

We need you

to think about what options you and your neighbours want. Whatever scheme is eventually adopted as a pilot (running for 18 months) it will necessitate give and take. It may mean we have to change our driving patterns in order to improve the roads in which we live (no pain no gain!)

We also have to be aware that businesses which operate on the boundaries of the five roads. We need them and do not want them to be adversely affected by our Home zone.

What is the Five Roads Forum?

What is a Home zone?

A home zone is a street or group of streets where pedestrians and cyclists have priority and cars are limited to a top speed of 10 mph. Drivers have to give way to pedestrians and cyclists and are normally responsible for any injury caused to them.
